

9 Stop at the lookout with the picnic bench.

- There is a museum past the lighthouse called the *Pointe Vicente Interpretive Center* and is open daily 10AM - 5PM*
- Giant brown kelp is essential to our marine ecosystem
- Harbor seals like to sunbathe on the rocks below
- The lighthouse is owned by the Coast Guard and has been fully operational since 1926

10 Continue walking, passing Nelson's.

- Nelson's is named after the character Mike Nelson from the 1960's TV Show *Sea Hunt*, which was filmed here
- From Memorial Day - Labor Day, Nelson's hosts a beer garden with live music*

* pending L.A. County mandates and policies.



11 Plant Life.

- Bicolor agave is the large two-colored succulent
- Lion's tail is the orange flowered plant native to South Africa
- More aloe vera!

12 Looking up, you will see the Fitness Center & Spa on your left.

- Our spa is a great place to relax and rejuvenate
- The Fitness Center offers many different classes (like spin & yoga)



13 This is a great spot to view our marine life.

- Look for gray whales, harbor seals, sea lions and pelicans!
- Gray whale migration season is December - May. During this time, 20 whales (on average) can be seen daily from the coast so keep an eye out!

14 As you walk along the trail you'll notice saltbush all around.

- Saltbush absorbs the ocean mist, takes in the fresh water to stay hydrated & expels the salt onto its leaves.

15 Walk past the cielo point pool to the picnic tables.

- These picnic tables are the perfect place to sit and look out over the horizon
- This is also where our Plein Air Painting classes take place



16 From the picnic tables, look down onto the beach cove.

- Kayaking and stand up paddleboarding are conducted from our beach cove with advanced reservations.*

*The Terranea Cave can be walked into at low tide at your own risk



17 Head up the stairs and to the mar'sel garden.

- Look to see what is growing! Depending on the season there are strawberries, kale, swiss chard, purple sage, tomatoes, basil, eggplants, and more!

18 Conclude your walk at pointe discovery & book your next adventure

Self-Guided NATURE WALK

Terranea Resort is home to many beautiful species of plants and animals. Use this guide to explore the property and learn more about the wildlife in the region as well as the history of the resort.

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iNaturalist

Learn and identify what plants and animals you see by downloading the iNaturalist app on your phone. Simply take a photo, turn on your location, upload the photo, and you will learn all about the species you see. Not only do you learn more about flora and fauna, but you are also contributing to a large network of data as a citizen scientist! This app is run by the California Academy of Science and National Geographic.

1 Start in the Lobby and look out at Catalina Island.

- Catalina Island is about 22 miles away from the mainland
- There is a population of bison that wander the island!
- During the summer, people swim for ~10 hours from Catalina to Terranea! You can spot them by looking for a slow boat with a kayaker next to it and some splashes in between. You can usually spot these swimmers between 8AM-12PM because the swimmers begin at midnight!

2 Walk down the stairs towards The Spa and look for the Aleppo pines and sago palms.

3 Walk along the asphalt road towards Nelson's and look for rosemary, which is used in the sea salt we make.

4 The strawberry tree has delicious fruit called madrones.

- Foxtail agave blooms once in its lifetime
- Lavender is purple, smells great, and helps with sleeping

5 Walk up the stairs along PV Meadows and look at the coral trees and aloe vera.

- 50 coral trees were transplanted from Marineland and replanted, mainly along the drive into Terranea. 47 have survived.
- This land was home to Marineland from 1954-1987
- Aloe vera is used to treat sunburns

6 Walk over to the Sea Salt Conservatory.

- Water from the ocean is collected and over time evaporates and leaves the sea salt
- The sea salt is currently used in dishes at mar'sel, treatments at The Spa, and is also for sale at sea beans!

7 Continue to walk along PV meadows to the Native Plant Trails.

- Coastal sage is nicknamed "cowboy cologne" and smells incredible

8 As you walk, notice the palm trees and the irrigation system.

- There are over 2,500 species of palm trees; each varies in the type of seeds and fruit it produces
- The brown pipe-like structures are part of an old irrigation system that is no longer in use because the native plants have been deemed established and fit to survive on their own
- Terranea and Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy planted 14 acres of native plant habitat which can be seen all along this route.
